

## B'nai Mitzvah Options Menu - \_\_\_\_\_

There are four basic options for B'nai Mitzvah candidates. They are:

<b>OPTION A – Torah &amp; Haftarah</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Torah (Maftir) and blessings</li> <li>Torah/Haftarah worksheet</li> <li>Haftarah blessings</li> </ul>	<b>OPTION B – Torah Emphasis</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Torah (Maftir section) and blessings</li> <li>Torah/Haftarah worksheet</li> <li>9 additional Torah verses</li> </ul>
<b>OPTION C – Torah &amp; Hallel Blessings</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Torah (Maftir section) and blessings</li> <li>Torah/Haftarah worksheet</li> <li>Hallel Psalms, blessings and worksheet</li> </ul>	<b>OPTION D – Customized Torah</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Special Accommodations</li> <li>Torah (Maftir section) and blessings</li> <li>Torah/Haftarah worksheet</li> </ul>

The chart below shows what is Required, Optional, and “Modified” for each option. Modifications are based on the individual needs/capabilities of the student. **\*CREATIVE DRASH:** Optional for all students, this may be used to enhance the teaching section of the student's B'nai Mitzvah speech.
